## **Light for the Blind Ministry (Vietnam)**

Ministry Report from Chi Yen Chi Luu thi

The Nguyen family is a large family which includes three generations. Unfortunately, five of the family members have been blind due to cataracts. They reside in Hamlet 23, Pho Khanh village, Duc Pho district, of the Quang Ngai province. The family consists of the following members: Nguyen Thi Chinh 87 years old, Nguyen Thi Doi 63 years old, Nguyen Lam, Nguyen Thi Kheo, blind until 1998. At 20 years old he was operated on and now has good eyesight. There is also Nguyen Van Phuoc, 13 years old and blind until having surgery at 8 years old.

The Nguyen family lives in a thatched hut and is too poor to afford daily meals of rice, but in 1998, Mr Nghiep of SAPP, helped these five blind people to receive the medical care and surgery they needed. The first night after their surgery no one could sleep because of the fear of the darkness of night. They were waiting for the morning sunrise so that they could see everything around them. They wanted to make sure that their new eyesight was a reality.

An agency offered them a small house in which they could live and, with their new eyesight, they are trying their best to work hard and build a new life. Nguyen Van Phuoc, age 13, continues to work to learn how to read, write, sing, and play the piano. He can use musical instruments very well. Many close and distant neighbors ask him to sing and play on their wedding day and feast days which enable him to earn a living. He is now considered the "bread-winner" in his family and has even been featured on a television show highlighting his new-found talent after eyes surgery.

In the same family, Nguyen Thi Kheo, Phuoc's, older sister, is upbeat after her surgery. She married a poor farmer (he's not blind), that works for 15.000 dong, equal to \$1 USD per day, a very low salary. The average a Vietnamese worker makes over three times as much. They have two children, a four-year old girl and a two-year old boy. These two children were born completely blind, but had eye surgery free of charge by Phaco technic.

After the successful surgeries, both children gained 3kgs in weight. Now they run around house and yard and look at every new thing with great happiness. Their parents now have more time to focus on their work. Living expenses in the family decreased greatly and their children can go to school like any other child. Love and pray for you.
